STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

These financial statements have been prepared by the Ministry of Education, Training & Employment in accordance with the provisions of the Public Management and Finance Law (2010 Revision).

We accept responsibility for the accuracy and integrity of the financial information in these financial statements and their compliance with the Public Management and Finance Law (2010 Revision).

As Chief Officer I am responsible for establishing; and have established and maintain a system of internal controls designed to provide reasonable assurance that the transactions recorded in the financial statements are authorised by law, and properly record the financial transactions of the Ministry of Education, Training & Employment.

As Chief Officer and Chief Financial Officer we are responsible for the preparation of the Ministry of Education, Training & Employment financial statements, representation and judgements made in these statements.

The financial statements fairly present the financial position, financial performance and cash flows of the Ministry of Education, Training & Employment for the financial year ended 30 June 2010, with the exception of the following which was represented to the Office of the Auditor General:

- In some instances due to historical deficiencies under the management of our predecessors, limited assurance was provided on the opening balances, which has resulted in several of the qualifications listed.
- Fixed Assets the value of property, plant and equipment needs to be revalued in accordance with IPSAS 17, however, this has to be done at the Entire Public Sector level and is outside of the control of this Ministry
- The Expensed AP Accrual account has a relative system flaw which would have affected the opening balance.

To the best of our knowledge we represent that these financial statements, with the exception of the items listed above:

- (a) Completely and reliably reflect the financial transactions of the Ministry of Education, Training & Employment for the year ended 30 June 2010;
- (b) fairly reflect the financial position as at 30th June 2010 and performance for the Year ended 30th June 2010;
- (c) comply with International Public Sector Accounting Standards as set out by International Public Sector Accounting Standards Board under the responsibility of the International Federation of Accountants. Where guidance is not available, the financial statements comply with International Accounting Standards issued by the International Accounting Standards Committee or accounting practice that is generally accepted in the United Kingdom as appropriate for reporting in the public sector.

The Office of the Auditor General conducts an independent audit and expresses an opinion on the accompanying financial statements. The Office of the Auditor General has been provided access to all the information necessary to conduct an audit in accordance with International Standards of Auditing.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT

To the Chief Officer of the Ministry Education, Training & Employment and the Members of the Legislative Assembly of the Cayman Islands

I have audited the accompanying financial statements for the Ministry of Education, Training & Employment, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2010 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in net worth and statement of cash flows for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory notes as set out on pages 11 to 31 in accordance with the provisions of Section 44(3) of the Public Management and Finance Law (2010 Revision).

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the International Public Sector Accounting Standards ("IPSAS"), and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing. Those standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend upon the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

Property, plant & equipment

Management represented that they could not assert to the value of property, plant and equipment of \$159M on the statement of financial position at 30 June 2010 as the Ministry's assets were not revalued in five years preceding the year ended 30 June 2010 in accordance with Financial Regulations (2008 revision) and as required by IPSAS 17.

Accounts Receivable

I was unable to satisfy myself that the amount of \$424 thousand reported as trade receivables is collectible due to lack of adequate supporting evidence. I was unable to perform alternative audit procedures to obtain reasonable assurance on the collectability of the amounts at June 30, 2010.

Prepayments

I was unable to satisfy myself that the amount of \$274,017 reported as prepaid system only is accurate due to lack of supporting documents.

Accounts Payable

Management represented that they could not assert to the accuracy of the Expense AP Accrual balance in the amount of \$1.5M due to a system flaw in IRIS – Oracle application which does not update the account with activities on the purchase orders.

Other Payables & Accruals

I was unable to carry out satisfactory audit procedures to obtain reasonable assurance for the accuracy of the inter entity due balance of \$250 thousand at June 30, 2010 due to inadequate supporting documents.

Employee Entitlement

I was unable to carry out satisfactory audit procedures to obtain reasonable assurance for the accuracy of salary related entitlement of \$1.19M at June 30, 2010 due to lack of supporting documents.

Personnel Costs

I was unable to carry out satisfactory audit procedures to obtain reasonable assurance for the accuracy of movement in annual leave provision of \$696 thousand at June 30, 2010 due to lack of supporting documents.

Net Worth

I was unable to satisfy myself that the amount of \$181M reported as net worth on the statement of financial position at 30 June 2010 was fairly stated because of the lack of adequate records on the beginning balance amounting to \$178M relating to the 2008-09 opening balances. In addition, I did not receive supporting evidence for a year end journal in the amount of \$539 thousand.

Qualified Opinion for the Financial Statements

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in the Basis of Qualified Opinion paragraphs, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Ministry of Education, Training and Employment as of 30 June 2010, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards.

Description and principal activities

The Ministry of Education, Training & Employment (further referred to as the "Ministry"), is a Government owned entity as defined by section 2 of the Public Management and Finance Law (2010 Revision) and it is domiciled in the Cayman Islands.

Its principal activities and operations include all activities carried out in terms of the outputs purchased by the Minister of Education, Training & Employment as defined in the Annual Plan and Estimates for the Government of Cayman Islands for the financial year ending 30 June 2010.

In addition, the Ministry has reported the activities and trust monies that it administers on behalf of Cabinet.

The composition of the Ministry changed between the fiscal year's 2008/9 and 2009/10 with the Department of Sports and the Youth Services Unit being transferred to another Ministry. The Cayman Islands National Archives was added to the Ministry. The change in composition of the Ministry will therefore be reflected in the presentation of the financial statements.

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with International Public Sector Accounting Standards (IPSAS) issued by the International Federation of Accountants and its International Public Sector Accounting Standards Board using the accrual basis of accounting. Where additional guidance is required, International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board are used.

There are no known accounting standards that have been adopted by the IPSAS Board for use in future years that will impact these financial statements.

The accounting policies set out below have been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are presented in Cayman Islands dollars and are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, unless otherwise stated. The measurement base applied to these financial statements is the historical cost basis.

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Changes in Accounting Policies

When presentation or classification of items in the financial statements is amended or accounting policies are changed, comparative figures are restated to ensure consistency with the current period unless it is impracticable to do so.

The presentation of the prior year financial statements has been changed to include a comparison of actual amounts with amounts in the original and final budget as required by IPSAS 24 including explanations of material difference between original budget and actual amounts.

The details and presentation of the Statement of Changes in Net Worth has been changed to show greater detail and to reflect changes in accounting policies and corrections of errors and omissions.

(b) Budget amounts

The original budget amounts for the financial year are as presented in the 2009/2010 Annual Budget Statement and approved by the Legislative Assembly on the 14 October 2009. The Final Budget is those budget amounts approved in Legislative Assembly. There is a supplementary budget which is pending approval of Cabinet.

(c) Judgments and Estimates

The preparation of financial statements is in conformity with International Public Sector Accounting Standards that requires judgments, estimates, and assumptions affecting the application of policies and reported amounts of assets and liabilities, revenue and expenses. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the reporting period and in any future periods that are affected by those revisions.

(d) Revenue

Revenue is recognised in the accounting period in which it is earned. Revenue received but not yet earned at the end of the reporting period is recognised as a liability (unearned revenue).

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(d) Revenue (continued)

The Ministry derives its revenue through the provision of services to Cabinet, to other agencies in government and to third parties. Revenue is recognised at fair value of services provided.

(e) Expenses

Expenses are recognised in the accounting period in which they are incurred.

(f) Operating leases

Operating lease payments are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term, where this is representative of the pattern of benefits to be derived from the leased property. Lease payments under operating lease, net of lease incentives received, are recognised as expenses on a straight-line basis over the lease term. Lease incentives received are recognised evenly over the term of the lease as a reduction in rental expense.

(g) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, cash in-transit and bank accounts with a maturity of no more than three months from the date of acquisition.

When there is objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired the losses are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Financial Performance.

(h) Prepayments

The portion of recognised expenditure paid in advance of receiving services has been recognised as a prepayment and is classified as accounts receivable in these financial statements.

(i) Inventories

Inventories held for distribution, or consumption in the provision of services, that are not issued on a commercial basis are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Where inventories are acquired at no cost, or for nominal consideration, the amount reported is the current replacement cost at the date of acquisition.

The amount reported for inventory held for distribution reflects management's estimates for obsolescence or other impairments.

Inventories held for sale or use in the production of goods and services on a commercial basis are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(i) Inventories (continued)

Costs are assigned to inventories using first-in first-out (FIFO) as appropriate.

The write-down from cost to current replacement cost or net realisable value is recognised in the statement of financial performance in the period when the write-down occurs.

(j) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment, is stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation. Items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. Where an asset is acquired for nil or nominal consideration, the asset is recognized initially at fair value, where fair value can be reliably determined, and as revenue in the Statement of Financial Performance in the year in which the asset is acquired.

Depreciation is expensed on a straight-line basis at rates calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of an item of property, plant and equipment (other than land); less any estimated residual value, over its estimated useful life. Leasehold improvements are depreciated either over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements, whichever is shorter.

(j) Property, Plant and Equipment (continued)

Disposals

Gains and losses on disposals of property, plant and equipment are determined by comparing the sale proceeds with the carrying amount of the asset. Gains and losses on disposals during the year are included in the Statement of Financial Performance.

(k) Employee Benefits

Employee entitlements to salaries and wages, annual leave, long service leave, retiring leave and other similar benefits are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance when they are earned by employees. Employee entitlements to be settled within one year following the year-end are reported as current liabilities at the amount expected to be paid.

Pension contributions for employees of the Ministry are paid to the Public Service Pension Fund and administered by the Public Service Pension Board (the "Board"). Contributions of 12% - employer 6% and employee 6% are made to the fund by the Ministry.

Prior to 1 January 2000 the Board operated a defined benefit scheme. With effect from 1 January 2000 the Board continued to operate a defined benefit scheme for existing employees and a defined contribution scheme for all new employees. Obligations for contribution to defined contribution retirement plans are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance as they are earned by employees. Obligations for defined benefit retirement plans are reported in the Consolidated Financial Statements for the Entire Public Sector of the Cayman Islands Government.

(I) Financial Instruments

The Ministry is party to financial instruments as part of its normal operations. These financial instruments include bank accounts, short term deposits, trade and accounts receivables and trade and accounts payable, all of which are recognised in the Statement of Financial Position.

Classification

A financial asset is classified as any asset that is cash, a contractual right to receive cash or another financial asset, exchange financial instruments under conditions that are potentially favourable. Financial assets comprise of cash and cash equivalents and prepayments.

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(I) Financial Instruments (continued)

A financial liability is any liability that is a contractual obligation to deliver cash or another financial instrument or to exchange financial instruments with another enterprise under conditions that are potentially unfavourable. Financial instruments comprise of accounts payable and accrued expenses.

Recognition

The Ministry recognises financial assets and financial liabilities on the date it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. From this date, any gains and losses arising from changes in fair value of the assets and liabilities are recognised in the statements of financial performance.

Measurement

Financial instruments are measured initially at cost which is the fair value of the consideration given or received. Subsequent to initial recognition all financial assets are recorded at historical cost, which is considered to approximate fair value due to the short-term or immediate nature of these instruments.

Financial liabilities are subsequently measured at amortised cost, being the amount at which the liability was initially recognised less any payment plus any accrued interest of the difference between that initial amount and the maturity amount.

De-recognition

A financial asset is de-recognition when the Ministry realises the rights to the benefits specified in the contract or loses control over any right that comprise that asset. A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, that is when the obligation is discharged, cancelled, or expired.

(m) Contingent Liabilities and Assets (including guarantees)

Contingent liabilities and assets are reported at the point the contingency becomes evident. Contingent liabilities are disclosed when there is a possible obligation or present obligations that may, but probably will not, require an outflow of resources. Contingent assets are disclosed if it is probable that the benefits will be realised.

Note 1: Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(n) Foreign Currency

Foreign currency transactions are recorded in Cayman Islands dollars using the exchange rate in effect at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency gains or losses resulting from settlement of such transactions are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance.

At the end of the reporting period the following exchange rates are to be used to translate foreign currency balances:-

- Foreign currency monetary items are to be reported in Cayman Islands dollars using the closing rate;
- Non-monetary items which are carried in terms of historical cost denominated in a foreign currency are reported in Cayman Islands dollars using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction; and
- Non-monetary items that are carried at fair value denominated in a foreign currency are reported using the exchange rates that existed when the fair values were determined.

(o) Comparative Figures

The presentation of the prior year financial statements has been changed to include a comparison of actual amounts with amounts in the original and final budget. Comparative figures are restated to ensure consistency with the current period unless it is impracticable to do so.

Note 2: Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand; bank accounts in the name of Ministry of Education, Training & Employment maintained at Royal Bank of Canada and short term deposits invested with the Cayman Islands Government Treasury. As at 30 June 2009 and 30 June 2010 the Ministry's unrestricted cash balances were as presented below. No restricted cash balances were held by the Ministry at 30 June 2010.

The Ministry has medium to long term accommodation leases for the premises it occupies in the George Town area and also in West Bay for the Sunrise Centre. The annual leases range from 1 to 3 years. The amounts disclosed above as future commitments are based on the current rental rates.

NOTE 19: Explanation of major variances against budget

Explanations for major variances for the Ministry's performance against the original budget are as follows:

Statement of financial performance

Cabinet revenue

Revenue from cabinet was \$1.7 million below budget due to efficiencies resulting in the Ministry achieving most targets without exceeding the price to Cabinet.

Other Revenue

Revenue from other sources was \$68,000 above budget due to donations and revenue received from miscellaneous receipts.

Personnel Costs

Personnel costs were \$2.174 million below budget due to delay in filling of positions, and also budgetary restrictions.

Supplies and consumables

Supplies and consumables were below budget due to efficiencies introduced as a result of increased budgetary restrictions.

Depreciation

Depreciation expenses were \$201,000 below budget due to timing of purchases and capitalization of depreciable assets.

Statement of financial position

Cash and cash equivalents

The actual year-end cash balances were \$16.7 million above budget due to good cash management and timing of capital payments.

Debtors and other receivables

The actual year-end debtors and other receivables balances were slightly higher than the original budget due to amounts related to Debtor Cabinet awaiting receipt. The gross figure was reduced by a provision of doubtful debts.

NOTE 19: Explanation of major variances against budget (Continued)

Fixed assets

Fixed assets were lower than the original budget due to delays in the new schools project. There was also an adjustment to move the value of land off the books of the Ministry as these amounts were Crown land held at the Executive level of Government. These amounts had been on the books since 2002.

Creditors and other payables

Creditors, accruals and other payables were higher than the original budget due to the timing of payments.

Statement of cash flows

Cash from operating activities

The decrease in cash from operating activities is due to timing of recurrent payments, and also as a result of cash restrictions on recurrent expenditure.

Cash from investing activities

The decrease in cash from investing activities is due to delays in the new schools project.

Cash from financing activities

The decrease in cash from financing activities is due to delays in the new schools project.

NOTE 20: Related party and key management personnel disclosures

Related party disclosure

The Ministry is a wholly owned entity of the government from which it derives a major source of its revenue. The Ministry and its key management personnel transact with other government entities on a regular basis. These transactions were provided free of cost during the financial year ended 30 June 2010 and were consistent with normal operating relationships between entities and were undertaken on terms and conditions that are normal for such transactions.
