1. INTRODUCTION

The Standing Business Committee was established by the Parliament Standing Orders, 2025 on the 3rd February, 2025.

The Parliament Standing Orders, Order 96 provides that:

- (1) *The Speaker shall convene a Business Committee at the commencement of each Parliament and the Speaker shall be the chairperson of the Business Committee.*
- (2) *The Business Committee consists of three members of the Government appointed by the Premier and two members for the Opposition. One member from the Opposition shall be appointed by the Leader of the Opposition and the other member shall be appointed by the other members of the Opposition. If the members of the Opposition are unable to agree on the appointment of a member from among themselves, the Speaker shall appoint such member.*
- (3) *The Business Committee may also meet, and make determinations, by electronic means, including remote participation.*
- (4) *The Business Committee shall determine how the business of the House will be ordered in a specified sitting in accordance with these Standing Orders and the following matters shall be considered –*
 - (a) that the hours of a specified sitting day be adjusted;*
 - (b) the arrangement of business will to be transacted in the House;*
 - (c) when business will be transacted in the House;*
 - (d) that any two or more items may be taken together for the purpose of debate; and*
 - (e) any other matters delegated to the Committee under the Standing Orders.*





Reference

The purpose of the meeting was to approve the Business of the House for the Fourth Meeting of the 2025-2026 Session of the Parliament commencing Wednesday, 4th March, 2026.

1. Meeting to Order

Chairman welcomed and thanked the Honourable Members for attending the Meeting. There being a quorum present, the Chairman brought the meeting to order at 10:10am.

2. Apologies

Mr. Seymour sent his apologies that he would be late.

3. Approval of Minutes and Report

- i. The Minutes of Friday, 31st October, 2025 were reviewed by the Members and were approved on a motion moved by Hon. Katherine Ebanks-Wilks and seconded by Hon. Rolston Anglin.
- ii. The Report of the Standing Business Committee – Third Meeting of the 2025-2026 Session of the Cayman Islands Parliament, which included the Minutes of 31st October, 2025 were reviewed and approved on a motion moved by Hon. Rolston Anglin and seconded by Hon. Kenneth Bryan.

4. Approval of House Business

Before the approval of the House Business began, Hon. Kenneth Bryan raised a procedural concern regarding the recently circulated Bills. He indicated that the Parliamentary Standing Orders, 2025 were flawed due to the lack of a definition of “urgent” and that full constitutional notification was not given for three of the Bills recently circulated and neither was he aware of a waiver from the Hon. Premier. He referred to the definition of “urgent” in Erskine May section 30 (42) and he was not confident that the Government had satisfied this definition. He stressed the 28 days provided in the Parliament Standing Orders 64 (a) and (b) allowed the Opposition and all constituents to seek clarification on these Bills and that the accepted standard would be for the Opposition to be given adequate notice. He questioned what was the urgency of these Bills.

In response, the Hon. Speaker emphasised that the Parliament was duty bound to follow Standing Orders and the Standing Orders can be changed by the majority of the Parliamentarians. The decision of what is urgent is a decision for the Premier who provided the Certification under section 77 (2) of the Constitution.

Hon. Kenneth Bryan questioned how the public can be prepared for this legislation without sufficient notice before the bills are debated in Parliament and that the Certification in the Standing Orders is not needed if sufficient notice is given. The Opposition just received notification of the Bills yesterday when Business Papers 12 and 13 were circulated to the members. No reasons were given for the urgency and the Public should be informed of the reasons.

The Hon. Speaker explained that the Certification does not need to be circulated and that there were two options for the Premier, postpone Parliament or proceed with the consideration that the Bill is too urgent to permit a delay. The Hon. Speaker asserted that procedure was followed and the Premier did what he should do.

The Hon. Premier gave his perspective on the discussion and acknowledged that he had experienced a similar situation when he was in the Opposition and understood the points made by Hon. Kenneth Bryan. The Hon. Premier was in favour of circulating the Certification to the Members.

Hon. Kenneth Bryan thanked the Premier for his input to the discussions.
